New Safety Measures Coming to Forest Hills

Work begins during summer break to strengthen multiple security points

Forest Hills School District is preparing to implement multiple new safety measures across all nine school buildings. The district received more than \$600,000 in competitive grant funding to help pay for security upgrades through Ohio's K-12 School Safety Grant Program.

The district worked with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office to review current safety measures and determine what areas would benefit most through potential grant funding. In the grant application, FHSD identified upgrades to school surveillance systems and strengthening entryway security as two target areas. Improvements in both areas are scheduled to start this summer.

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Community Partnership Program Wraps Up Successful First Semester

Students explore medicine, construction, law and much more

More than 100 students from Anderson High School and Turpin High School participated in a wide variety of activities through the newly revamped Community Partnership Program during the spring semester. The program is designed to offer hands-on experiences for students outside the classroom and in career fields they find interesting. Depending on the industry, students are able to pursue internships, shadowing opportunities or workshops.

OrthoCincy Orthopaedics & Sports Medicine and The Christ Hospital Health Network, as FHSD's official sports medicine and wellness partners, offered indepth internships that covered a variety of medical and health care careers. This allowed students to see, first-hand, what it's like working in different medical fields and learn about the skills required to succeed in these important industries.

The Community Partnership Program encourages students to get involved in shaping their own experiences. Christina Johnson, AHS rising senior, was able to secure a nationwide fellowship through Project InSight. This allows her to connect with organizations that specialize in vision and eye health, like Clovernook Center For The Blind and Visually Impaired and May We Help. Christina will continue this work over the summer, building on her passion for medical technology and engineering.

Other students were able to learn about law, aviation, construction, law enforcement and more. The program will continue in the fall with similar opportunities, as well as the Aspire: Youth Discovery Initiative. This is a new leadership development program for sophomores made possible by an expanded partnership with the Anderson Area Chamber of Commerce.

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FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

At Forest Hills School District, we understand the responsibility we have to taxpayers, students, staff and the entire community to operate in a financially sound manner. We work tirelessly to do everything we can to be strong stewards of public funds and, as Treasurer, I appreciate the importance of being transparent about district finances. Part of our efforts to meet those expectations include FHSD's participation in the Ohio Checkbook and regular reports to the community via Board of Education meetings and publications like this.

With the passage of the combination levy on May 2, 2023, it's all the more important to be clear about how the district plans to utilize those new funds and how it helps FHSD accomplish its mission to prepare the next generation for success now and after graduation.

The 5.4 mill operating levy can be used for any general purpose related to the operation of the district, including staff salaries, classroom supplies and other day-to-day expenses. The 1.5 mill permanent improvement levy is required by law to only be spent on properties, assets or improvements with an estimated life or usefulness of five years or more (building updates, roofs, parking lots, heating and cooling systems, or new buses or technology).

In May, I published an update to the current five-year forecast, which looks at the district's General Fund revenues, expenditures and cash balance. With the community's support through this additional funding, the forecast now projects a nearly \$17 million ending cash balance in fiscal year 2027. Costs, however, are still projected to increase year-over-year, which could lead to deficit spending as early as fiscal year 2026.

FHSD will continue to look for ways to reduce costs and increase operational efficiencies to ensure this investment from the community is stretched as many years as possible. This is an ongoing process that the district practices each and every year, focused on providing the best possible education at a reasonable cost.


